INITIAL DECISION

INTRODUCTION

On October 11, 2005 the appellant filed an appeal requesting reversal of the September 7, 2005 reconsideration decision of the Office of Personnel Management (OPM). The reconsideration decision denied the appellant a disability retirement annuity. The Board has jurisdiction over the appeal. *See* 5 U.S.C.A. § 8347(d)(West 1996); 5 C.F.R. § 831.110 (2005). This appeal is decided on the written record.

The appeal is DISMISSED.

ANALYSIS AND FINDINGS


During the processing of this appeal, OPM notified the Board that it rescinded its September 7, 2005 reconsideration decision and approved the appellant's application for a disability retirement annuity. OPM stated that based on its review of additional medical evidence submitted by the appellant, the appellant has established that he is eligible for a disability retirement annuity. OPM stated it is granting the appellant's claim for disability retirement benefits and moved to dismiss the appeal.

Because OPM rescinded its decision and granted the appellant's application for a disability retirement annuity, no matter remains before the Board for adjudication and the appeal must be dismissed. *See Tamayo v. Office of Personnel Management*, 56 M.S.P.R. 620, 622 (1993); *Cooper v. Office of Personnel Management*, 23 M.S.P.R. 81 (1984). OPM's motion is GRANTED.

DECISION

The appeal is DISMISSED.

NOTICE TO APPELLANT

This initial decision will become final on ^{ve} **February 16, 2006**, unless a petition for review is filed by that date or the Board reopens the case on its own motion. This is an important date because it is usually the last day on which you can file a petition for review with the Board. However, if this initial decision is received by you more than 5 days after the date of issuance, you may file a petition for review within 30 days after the date you actually receive the initial decision. The date on which the initial decision becomes final also controls when

you can file a petition for review with the Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit. The paragraphs that follow tell you how and when to file with the Board or the federal court. These instructions are important because if you wish to file a petition, you must file it within the proper time period.

BOARD REVIEW

You may request Board review of this initial decision by filing a petition for review. Your petition, with supporting evidence and argument, must be filed with:

A petition for review may be filed by mail, facsimile (fax), personal or commercial delivery, or electronic filing. A petition for review submitted by electronic filing must comply with the requirements of 5 C.F.R. § 1201.14, and may only be accomplished at the Board's e-Appeal website (<https://e-appeal.mspb.gov>).

If you file a petition for review, the Board will obtain the record in your case from the administrative judge and you should not submit anything to the Board that is already part of the record. Your petition must be filed with the Clerk of the Board no later than the date this initial decision becomes final, or if this initial decision is received by you more than 5 days after the date of issuance, 30 days after the date you actually receive the initial decision. The date of filing by mail is determined by the postmark date. The date of filing by electronic filing is the date of submission. The date of filing by personal delivery is the date on which the Board receives the document. The date of filing by commercial delivery is the date the document was delivered to the commercial delivery service. Your petition may be rejected and returned to you if you fail to provide

a statement of how you served your petition on the other party. *See* 5 C.F.R. § 1201.4(j).

JUDICIAL REVIEW

You may not file your petition with the court before this decision becomes final. To be timely, your petition must be received by the court no later than 60 calendar days after the date this initial decision becomes final.
